Sermon 1-24-2021 “Today Is the Right Day to Begin Mending Our Nets”

This has been a long, long political season. It's been a long, long pandemic season. Both of those are things that have led to a lot of strife between friends, neighbors, and sometimes even family. You see, we don't always agree about political candidates, or whether we should wear masks, or not, so sometimes we are not kind to each other. When we are not kind, that leads to brokenness, broken hearts, broken lives, broken relationships.

Last September when I was at Time to Sow (lectionary boot camp) reading through the Scriptures, I recognized that today's Gospel spoke of how the disciples were doing their regular work of mending their nets and were then called by Jesus, and how this scripture would fall just after we had just inaugurated a president. I hadn't a clue who that President would be, but I knew that we too would have net mending work to do.

Please let me share with you a couple of things that Vince Esparza, shared with me earlier this week. I called Vince, knowing him to be a fisherman and said, I know that you have been a fisher person much of your life, so could you bring me a net? Vince first apologized that he only had a net like this one, where you scoop up your fish after you have caught them, because Vince, when I told him the scripture lesson, realized that what I really needed was a hand cast net that would have been what the disciples probably were using, and therefore, mending. But those are relatively rare these days, unless you come across native people fishing at the edge of the ocean or the edge of the river using that type of net.

Vince brought this net, and I thought it was particularly good for today's purpose because there's a broken place in this net. It needs to be mended

because of the hole in it right here. I tried to get a video of how to mend nets, but it didn't seem very helpful for us to actually learn how to mend nets because maybe we need to be more about mending relationships, but there's a hole here, so you wouldn't want to use this net if you were out fishing because your fish might swim away, swim away like some of our friends and family and relationships may have done over the past few months.

Vince told me that the other reason I wouldn't want to use a net like this if I were out fishing is because this net is an old fashioned one, and it hurts the fish when you catch them. A net like this has sharp netting, and it catches in their gills and hurts them. The fish might not even live through that experience. As fly fisherman, Vince practiced catch and release most of the time, so he brought in the right net for me to see. Vince said that this one is the net I'd want to use if I were fly fishing. It's got magnets, so he could attach it to his fishing vest, so the net's always handy. This is a soft, silicone net that doesn't hurt the fish.

What does a fish net that is safe for fish have to do with us? It's about us, learning to mend our nets, and to once again make our words safe for friends and family, safe for neighbors. It's being able to rejoice when we can gather together, virtually or in person, knowing that we are able to care for each other, and respect each other.

The founder of Methodism, John Wesley, had some particular advice when it came to elections. Because you see, this year was not the first time there has been a contentious election. In October of 1774 John Wesley was preaching in town near Bristol, where a contentious election for parliament was underway. The chief candidates were Edmund Bercy, and Henry Krueger, who differed in their political ideologies, their position on the American colonies, and their support from religious groups. Does any of this sound familiar in an election we might have just been through? In the days leading up to the election, while in the town of Pill, he met with members of the local Methodist Society, and offered this important guidance as they prepared to elect a new leader for the country. October 6, 1774 - "I met those of our society who had votes in the ensuing election and advised them, number one, to vote without fee or reward for the person they judged most worthy. Number two, to speak no evil of the person they voted against, and perhaps for us, the most important part of this advice is number three, to take care that their spirits

were not sharpened against those who voted on the other side. They were to mend their nets, to use that beautiful soft silicone net to gather in, and then, to set free those that they wanted to be in relationship with. Praises be to God that we can mend our nets. Amen.

United Methodist Women – Mary Nagel

The Paschal Meal was one of the finest projects the Trinity United Methodist Women did. It was held on Maundy Thursday and was started in 1953 by Rev. Henry Haines and his wife. The food was prepared and served in a very somber and quiet manner. Over the years and with the participation of Rev. Laron Hall, procedure changed. He stated the Paschal Meal (the Passover Seder) was a time of thankfulness and celebration. No one knew the outcome after “the Last Supper.” Tradition still held as far as the tables arranged in a cross with white and purple decorations, baskets of fruits and candles. The place settings were combined with communion elements and a salad sized plate of a small container of salt water, parsley, haroseth, a hardboiled egg, olives, dates, nuts and unleavened bread (matza bread). All symbolic of the Jewish Seder. After the Maundy service, a traditional lamb stew served over rice was offered. Each circle had workers in the kitchen for two days preparing for this. On reflection, it’s interesting to note, because of the cost of lamb, Mary Nagel substituted beef, telling no one except the “Mary Marthas” of the kitchen crew. Afterwards several participants, while thanking the workers, said it was the best lamb stew they’d ever eaten!!!!



Speaking of kitchens, in 1963, knowing the church was two years in arrears in its missionary pledges, the Society (WSCS) gave \$1800 to help the church out of difficulty. The Society was saving the money for a new kitchen. Trinity was giving \$900 a year at that time to the support of John Kaemmer, a missionary in Angola. Later, the Trustees saw that the women did get their new kitchen!!!

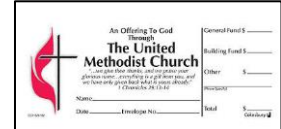

Vaccinations for 65 or older to start early February. – Don Rohde



Idahoans 65 years and older can expect vaccinations to start early February (final date to be determined). Since there are about 250,000 Idahoans in this group, a tiered approach may be needed depending on supply.

Eastern Idaho Public Health (EIPH) will announce a schedule for vaccinating this group prior to Feb. 1st.

Individuals in this group may contact their local public health district, local pharmacy, or primary care clinician to learn more or schedule an appointment. Use the EIPH Vaccine Hotline: (208) 533-3235 or go to <https://eiph.idaho.gov/>



There will be a group #3 in March for people 16 to 64 with underlying medical conditions listed below. Contact your primary care clinician to learn more or schedule an appointment.

- Cancer
- Chronic kidney disease
- COPD (chronic obstructive pulmonary disease)
- Down Syndrome
- Heart conditions, such as heart failure, coronary artery disease, or cardiomyopathies
- Immunocompromised state (weakened immune system) from solid organ transplant
- Obesity (body mass index [BMI] of 30 kg/m² or higher but < 40 kg/m²)
- Severe Obesity (BMI ≥ 40 kg/m²)
- Pregnancy
- Sickle cell disease
- Smoking
- Type 2 diabetes mellitus

Online signup is accomplished through the EIPC website and requires an email address to receive the confirmation. When it is your group's turn and if you need help in signing up or need help with transportation, please contact the Pam at the church office at 208-522-7921 and she will help make arrangements.

We will publish updates in the newsletter as they happen.

CAUTION: Remember there are 2 shots required, spaced a month apart. You will start to have some immunity seven days after your first dose. Your immunity will continue to build and will reach a peak about two weeks after the second dose (total of 6 weeks). Don't be lured into a false sense of safety. Wear your masks, wash your hands and keep your physical distance.

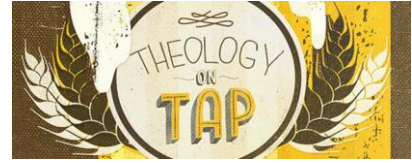
A Lesson from The Christian Scriptures - (Mark 1:14-20)

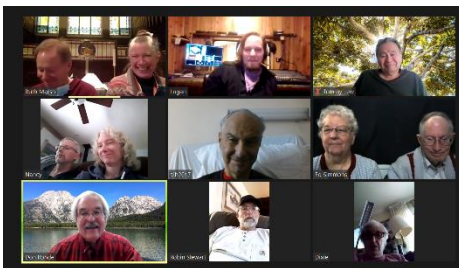
Prayer Group

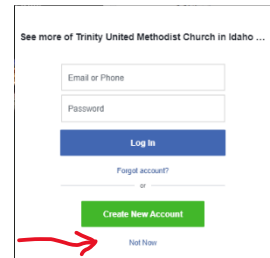

ON THE LAPTOP:

1. go to GOOGLE CHROME web browser and type in:
2. <https://www.facebook.com/TUMCIF/>
3. The Trinity Facebook page comes up and you can see the video.
4. Then a Facebook "sign on" window comes up
5. At the bottom of the Sign on Window there was a "NOT NOW" button
6. Push that button and you are free to watch the live stream on a laptop without a Facebook account.



ON THE APPLE CELL PHONE:

1. go to GOOGLE CHROME web browser and type in:

3. The Trinity Facebook page comes up and you can see the video.
4. Then a Facebook sign on window came up
5. Using your finger scroll down the screen
6. A second Facebook sign on window comes up
