

Thoughts from Ruth

On this day in 1965, known in U.S. history as “Bloody Sunday,” some 600 people began a 54-mile march from Selma, Alabama, to the state capitol in Montgomery. They were commemorating the death of Jimmy Lee Jackson, who had been shot on February 18 by a state trooper while trying to protect his mother, during a civil rights demonstration. You can see the peaceful march across the bridge.

This is what it turned into: after the marchers crossed the Edmund Pettus Bridge at Selma, white State Troopers assaulted them, knocking many to the

ground and beating them with nightsticks. Another detachment of troopers fired tear gas while mounted troopers charged the marchers. A total of 17 marchers were hospitalized and 50 treated for lesser injuries. Among them was a young John Lewis, whose name you might recognize, as a senior Congressman who passed away in the last few

months. This is a picture of him being beaten by a state trooper in Selma,



Alabama, on March 7, 1965. He suffered a fractured skull from the beating.

This tragedy happened 100 years after the end of the Civil War. The 15th amendment had been effectively nullified by discriminatory laws in much of the South, keeping many blacks from the polls. In Selma, where African Americans made up more than half of the population, they constituted only about 2% of the registered voters. That is an uneven power dynamic.

What does all of this history lesson have to do with today's scriptures? Today's gospel is sometimes used to show that Jesus would have used violence where needed, but a careful reading of this passage in John

shows us that what Jesus did was to drive the cattle and sheep out of the temple courtyard with a whip. He did not use a whip to harm other humans. Jesus overturned the tables of the money changers to make the point that they were dishonoring God and harming God's people. What Jesus was doing was changing the power dynamic of his day much like those who were protesting the fact that Selma had so little political representation by persons of color.

The crime that Jesus committed, that he would go on to be killed for, was upsetting commerce, was upsetting how the political leaders and the religious leaders of the day kept control of the people. That was the crime that Jesus committed, not a crime of harming others. And certainly, if we read that scripture carefully, we see that Jesus would have been much more likely to stand arm in arm with folks like Martin Luther King, Jr. as they peacefully protested, rather than with folks who would cause violence and harm to others. You see, if we carefully listen to the Scripture, we notice that the money changers were still in the temple courtyard. Jesus overturned their tables to make a point. He wanted them to understand that it was not appropriate to bring the secular world into the temple. It was not appropriate for them to have the Roman money there in the temple, and it was not fair or appropriate for them to use the exchange of money to make God's people even less able to care for themselves because they became more entrenched in poverty. It still is wrong to do those things. In this country we have seen in the past few decades, wealth accumulated at the top like never before, and it's time to change the power dynamic. It's time that we hear the

peaceful protest of Jesus who says, "Use money to care for each other." "Use your resources to care for each other." It's time that we heard Jesus as He drove cattle and sheep out of the temple and spoke to the people about what they could do to help each other. It's time that we understood that we worship a God of grace and a God of peace who weeps when we harm each other. It's time that we stopped using scriptures such as the one we read today, to say, "Oh well, I'm sure Jesus must have wanted to kick somebody's butt from time to time, and so I'm sure it's okay if I do it." It's time for us to let Jesus change the power dynamic enough in our hearts that we can build relationships with people. It's time for us to know that God calls all of us to be in community and in communion with each other. It's time for us to know that the money changers' tables have been turned over, and the money spilled off, because room was needed at the table for God's Communion, God's gift, to which everybody is invited, to which we are all equal, no matter our age, no matter our background, no matter whether we are rich or poor, no matter what language we speak, because we are all capable of speaking the language of love. In the United Methodist Church, communion is always open to everyone for exactly these reasons.

We need a crockpot of food or casserole meals for about a dozen people each day. We can provide the crock pot and ingredients if needed.










Infection Rate

Friday, March 5, 2021:

EIPH is now scheduling appointments for anyone currently eligible (see the green box below) to receive a vaccine.

WHO'S UP NEXT TO BE VACCINATED?

The following groups are next in line to be vaccinated, but dates are subject to change depending on vaccine supply. [Click here](#) for more information.

On March 5, 2021, Idaho Department of Health and Welfare launched a COVID-19 Vaccine Pre-Registration System for people to get on a list to receive a vaccination when it is your turn.

March 15, 2021 (Idaho Subgroup 2.3)

- Food and agriculture workers (including food processing workers)
- USDA processing plant inspectors
- Grocery, convenience store, and food pantry workers
- Idaho National Guard, if not included earlier
- Manufacturing workers
- Public transit workers
- U.S. Postal Service workers
- Subset of essential gas, electric, water, and telecommunications utility workers, who work indoors
- Homeless shelter residents
- Flight Crews

If you previously registered on EIPH's wait list under Subgroup 2.3, you do NOT need to re-register on the State's registration tool. EIPH will call/text you beginning on Monday, March 8 to schedule an appointment for you.

Late April (COVID-19 Vaccine Advisory Committee has not yet prioritized this group)

- Other essential workers
- Individuals 16–64 years of age with high-risk medical conditions

May

General public/individuals 16–64 years of age

Waiting lists for "Other Essential Workers, individuals with high-risk medical conditions, and the general public" will be made available in the near future as these subgroups get closer to being eligible for vaccination.

A Lesson from The Christian Scriptures (John 2:13-22)

Jesus Cleanses the Temple

13 The Passover of the Jews was near, and Jesus went up to Jerusalem. 14 In the temple he found people selling cattle, sheep, and doves, and the money changers seated at their tables. 15 Making a whip of cords, he drove all of them out of the temple, both the sheep and the cattle. He also poured out the coins of the money changers and overturned their tables. 16 He told those who were selling the doves, "Take these things out of here! Stop making my Father's house a marketplace!" 17 His disciples remembered that it was written, "Zeal for your house will consume me." 18 The Jews then said to him, "What sign can you show us for doing this?" 19 Jesus answered them, "Destroy this temple, and in three days I will raise it up." 20 The Jews then said, "This temple has been under construction for forty-six years, and will you raise it up in three days?" 21 But he was speaking of the temple of his body. 22 After he was raised from the dead, his disciples remembered that he had said this; and they believed the scripture and the word that Jesus had spoken. 
The bulletin board outside of the sanctuary doors has been dedicated to the prayer life of the community. Paper and pencils are available for making your request.


You can **always** drop by the church from 9 - 3 to visit with Ruth or just sit in the sanctuary to soak in the beauty and the good spirit.

Theology on Tap - The Home Edition^(P)





Watching Trinity Worship Video Without a F.B. Account. (P)




Yes, you can watch Trinity Sunday morning worship video without a Facebook account.

ON THE LAPTOP:

1. go to GOOGLE CHROME web browser and type in:
2. <https://www.facebook.com/TUMCIF/>
3. The Trinity Facebook page comes up and you can see the video.
4. Then a Facebook "sign on" window comes up
5. At the bottom of the Sign on Window there was a "NOT NOW" button
6. Push that button and you are free to watch the live stream on a laptop without a Facebook account.

ON THE CELL PHONE: (P)

1. go to web browser and type in:
2. <https://www.facebook.com/TUMCIF/>
3. The Trinity Facebook page comes up and you can see the video.
4. Then a Facebook sign on window came up
5. Using your finger scroll down the screen
6. A second Facebook sign on window comes up
7. Close that 2nd window by pressing the "X" box up in the top right corner
8. You can see the video on the screen and play it by pressing the play triangle
9. It only shows the latest videos.
10. If you press SHOW ALL you can see all the videos back to March.
11. You are free to watch the live stream on an iPhone without a Facebook account.


Bottle Filling Stations
