

Theme: The Reign of Christ Sunday Sermon Title: But the People Stood By Watching"

LESSON FROM THE CHRISTIAN GOSPEL (Luke 23:33-43)

When they came to the place that is called The Skull, they crucified Jesus there with the criminals, one on his right and one on his left. Then Jesus said, "Forgive them, for they do not know what they are doing." And they cast lots to divide his clothing. And the people stood by watching, but the leaders scoffed at him, saying, "He saved others; let him save himself if he is the Messiah of God, the chosen one!" The soldiers also mocked him, coming up and offering him sour wine and saying, "If you are the King of the Jews, save yourself!" There was also an inscription over him, "This is the King of the Jews."

One of the criminals who were hanged there kept deriding him and saying, "Are you not the Messiah? Save yourself and us!" But the other rebuked him, saying, "Do you not fear God, since you are under the same sentence of condemnation? And we indeed have been condemned justly, for we are getting what we deserve for our deeds, but this man has done nothing wrong." Then he said, "Jesus, remember me when you come into your kingdom." Jesus replied, "Truly I tell you, today you will be with me in paradise."

Last Week's Sermon 11/13

"Don't' Panic" based on Luke Luke 21:5-19



Someone recently told me they have been pondering perseverance lately. Today's scripture is right there with you friend! But... even when life feels busy, overwhelming, and loud. Don't panic!

Yes, the unthinkable may have happened. Yes, it might seem impossible to comprehend. Yes, it seems like the structures of our world have been thrown down, and not one stone is left upon another. Yes, the nations are gripped by terror and dismay, and many are screaming "Doom! Doom!" Be on your guard, by all means, but don't panic.



In the Gospel reading for today, Luke recounts a story about Jesus in Jerusalem in the looming days before his

crucifixion. The Palm Sunday parade has already happened, and already the shouts of Hosanna have curdled to questions, threats and challenges to his authority.

When Luke recorded these words from Jesus, his readers were reeling from the destruction of the majestic Jerusalem Temple and much of the city by the Romans. The events were so shocking and earth-shattering, that many began announcing the imminent end of the world. But Luke repeats the words of Jesus: Don't be led astray by the doomsday prophets who are always trying to read everything as a sign of what God is going to do next.

In the year 410, when Rome fell to the Visigoths, many, both Christians and pagans, were sure it was a sign of something big happening in the heavens, and Christians were again looking to these apocalyptic passages of scripture, and thinking that the world was about to end.

In 2001, it was year C in the Revised Common Lectionary, like 2022 is, and we heard this same reading from Luke's gospel just two months after the earth-shattering 9/11 attacks in the USA. Again it seemed that the symbolic center of the world had been brought crashing down. There were wars and rumors of wars; there was a great surge of destructive nationalism, and speculations were ripe that the end was near. Today we hear these words again, as war rages in Ukraine, we wait to hear the final outcome of elections, and while we continue to reel from recent Supreme Court decisions.

Many will come saying "This is it." "The time is near." "He is the one." "It's a sign." —Do not go after them. Don't panic!



Jesus is not, however, saying that we shouldn't worry about these events. He is not saying that they don't matter and that we can ignore them. Jesus is saying that we shouldn't waste our time or energy trying to interpret them as signs of something beyond themselves. These things are to be taken seriously as intensely human events, not fixated over to see if they can be squeezed into some interpretation of biblical prophecy.

The right response is to recognize them as signs of who we are, and what we are doing to ourselves, not what God is doing.

What God is doing is not changed by these events. God is continuing to call us to be ambassadors of love, mercy and reconciliation in a world that seems increasingly gripped by torrents of hatred, resentment and hostility. God is continuing to call us to build bridges even when others call for the building of walls. God is continuing to call us to be those who will sacrifice our own interests in the service of others, no matter who is standing up and inciting mobs with promises to "put our own interests first."

These events are intensely and thoroughly human. God is not orchestrating the rise of divisive nationalism or resentful hostility. God is, as always, to be found among the first victims of such outbreaks. Those who embody love and mercy most fully are always the first to be crucified when aroused mobs are looking for their next victim.



So we are not to fall for panicked predictions that God is about to destroy the world, but neither are we to be complacent and think that the threats aren't real. Those who unify their support base by inciting frenzies of rage against the vulnerable will create conditions in which being a faithful ambassador of the culture of Jesus will be a risky business.

As Jesus went on to say in the reading we heard, "But before it is over, they will arrest you and persecute you; they will hand you over to synagogues and prisons, and you will be brought before kings and governors because of my name. ... You will be betrayed even by parents and brothers, by relatives and friends; and they will put some of you to death. You will be hated by all because of my name." There is no room for complacency.

When angry resentful mobs are determined

to identify vulnerable enemies to vent their fury on, those who stand in solidarity with the crucified will not remain safe for long. The end may not be near, but the dangers are real, and the challenges of uncompromising faithfulness to the ways of Jesus are not to be taken lightly.



After giving all this "doom talk" today perhaps it is time to ask the question: Do we have the power to stop THIS future if we act now. You see, if we only pay attention to the immediate fear and destruction present in the shouting in front of us, we are likely to miss out on God's kingdom life that is right here, but may take a long time to become visible. So we must be willing to play the long game, and willing to play it WITH God.

Today, we must ask: will we choose the path that leads to healing the earth, or will we continue our destructive ways – politically, economically, and ecologically? Will our actions lead to joy or sorrow? The future is open. God cannot – or will not – heal the world without our partnership. We must reclaim our vocation as the hands, feet, heart, and protest of God.

I know that I need to NOT focus on all the things that can go wrong. Jesus makes it clear that these things are out of our

control — and no matter how bad things are, Jesus is there to walk with us.

Jesus promises that "not a hair of your head will perish, and by your endurance you will gain your souls," but he says that immediately after saying that "they will put some of you to death" so he is not promising that you won't get hurt. The road to life and love without limit goes by the way of the cross. The words of Jesus, and the news of global chaos all remind us that "the way of the cross" is a lot more than a harmless metaphor. But so is the promise of life and love without limit.

Amen.




