

All the things hand do
Sermon Title "Get Up"
(Acts 9:36-43)

In a nearby coastal city, Joppa, there lived a disciple whose Aramaic name was Tabitha, or Dorcas in Greek. She was a good woman—devotedly doing good and giving to the poor. While Peter was in Lydda, she fell sick and died. Her fellow disciples washed her body and laid her in an upstairs room. They had heard Peter was nearby, so two of them went with an urgent message, "Please come to Joppa as soon as possible."

Peter went with them and immediately entered the room where the corpse had been placed. It was quite a scene—the widows of the community were crowded in the room, weeping, showing the various items of clothing that Dorcas had made for them.

Peter asked them to leave the room; then he got on his knees. He prayed for a while and then turned to her body and said, "Tabitha, get up!"

She opened her eyes, saw Peter, and sat up. Giving her his hand, Peter lifted her up. Then he called in the other disciples—including the widows—and reintroduced them to their beloved friend. The news of this miracle spread throughout the city, and many believed in the Lord. Peter stayed in Joppa for some time as the guest of Simon, a tanner by profession.



Our church's financial status for year-to-date March 31, 2022:





Sermon from 5/1


“Do You Love Me”

(Based on John 21:1-19)



Last Sunday we noted that although John’s gospel tells us that Jesus had given his disciples the gift of the Holy Spirit and commissioned them to take his message out into the world, a week later they were still locked behind the doors of their fear in an upstairs room.

Not only had they not yet become the fearless apostles who would spread the message to the ends of the earth, but they hadn’t even managed to convince Thomas, the one of their own number, who had been absent when Jesus had turned up, overwhelmingly alive, on that first day.



Well, here we are, another week later, and I’m pleased to say that they have now made it out from behind the locked door. However, taking on the world still seems a fair way off. Far from stepping out to become the one who fishes for people, Simon Peter, is ready to go back to fishing for fish. Peter is a fisherman by trade. When Peter goes fishing it probably means that he thinks everything else has run its course and there is nothing left to do but go back to his old job, and his friends are ready to go with him.



What you may not have noticed about this story is its deliberate connection to a previous story about Peter. The gospel writer adds an extra hint when he tells us that this conversation happens beside a charcoal fire on the beach. Only once before in the gospel has John mentioned a charcoal fire. While Jesus was being interrogated in the High Priest’s house,


Peter was warming himself by a charcoal fire in the courtyard outside when people started asking if he was one of Jesus's followers, and three times he denied even knowing him. So now, by another charcoal fire in the uncomfortable presence of the one he had denied, Peter is again questioned three times. And interestingly, Jesus reverts to calling him by his original name; his unconverted name? "Simon, son of John, do you love me?" Once for each denial. "Simon, son of John, do you love me?" "Simon, son of John, do you love me?"

There is a saying that all that is needed for evil to prevail, is for good people to remain silent, and even though he had been warned, and swore he could withstand it, Peter had fallen silent and stood aside as the rooster crowed and evil had its way. Imagine Jesus' gaze falling on you... "I know what you did back there by that charcoal fire in the courtyard, Simon, son of John, so I ask you now, do you love me?"



And isn't that just so like Jesus? Just when you think you've thrown in the towel and gone back to living without him, there he is, turning up again to show you that you can't even do what you've always done unless you do it the Jesus way. Even the fish won't bite unless he says so. And just when you think everything is lost and nothing will ever go right for you again, there he is, handing you just what you need. The good things you were searching for, all that you had

yearned for, and perhaps despaired of ever seeing, there it all is jumping into your boat, poured into your lap with such extravagance that you have no idea what to do with it all. Just when you thought everything you had believed in was snuffed out and everything you'd put your hopes in for the future was truly dead and buried, there he is, standing on the beach, more alive than ever, and cooking you breakfast!



The questions that Jesus asks Peter that morning, beside the charcoal fire, at the Sea of Galilee, can be interpreted several different ways.

"Do you love me more than these?" could be asking "Do you love me more than these worldly ways of making a living and the worldly comforts that it might come of it?" How many times had the disciples heard Jesus talk about wealth? Jesus had invited the rich young man to sell all that he had, give the proceeds to the poor, and follow Him. Then later in private, Jesus had told the disciples how difficult it would be for those who held on tight to their riches to get into heaven... some outlandish stuff about camels and needles...

Use your resources to feed my lambs.



Or it might mean, “Do you love me more than you love these buddies who make up your everyday life?”

Jesus had asked the disciples to love him as much as life itself and more than family or friends. He told them parables about people turning their head and looking back while plowing the fields. Jesus wanted their full attention as they picked up the cross and followed him.



You will need to be attentive to shepherd my sheep.

Or Jesus could be asking, “Do you love me more than the other disciples do?”

If Peter was to be the rock on which the church was built, then it would take extraordinary devotion to the living God of Love. Peter would have to forge new relationships with the likes of Paul, who we met in the lesson from Acts this morning, and a lifetime of service would be required as indicated in the way Jesus alludes to Peter’s death as an apostle.

It may take a lifetime to feed Jesus’ sheep.

The scholar's translation of the bible adds, “then keep” in the answer to each of the questions. Then keep feeding my lambs, then keep shepherding my sheep, then keep feeding my sheep.” You see, it all boils down to that the way we show that we love Jesus is to do what Jesus asked of us. We must love others as Jesus first loved us.

Jesus realized that Peter and the rest of the disciples would be tempted to return life just as it was before they met Jesus. We may be tempted to do that as well, but may we continue to walk in the Way of Christ’s love.



Summer Food Service Program

Hello Friends!

We are getting ready for the Summer Food Service Program of 2022! We deeply appreciate your help and support in past summers and that is why I am reaching out to you today. We are looking for volunteers that would like to sign up with your church, school, or organization, for one week blocks of time.

I will host a Summer Food Program training via zoom on May 21, 4pm - 5:30pm. This training will be recorded, so that anyone that can't attend that day can watch it later. It is ideal that you attend on the day of training so that questions and concerns can be addressed.

Teams should consist of 4 people, it is important that at least 2 members of your team have the ability to lift 25lbs. The daily time commitment is 11:30AM - 3:30PM M-F, on the week of your choosing. We are doing congregate lunch service this year, meaning kids will need to eat their meals in the park. We will meet at the Soup Kitchen (301 S. Boulevard) and load the food into the coolers and load the food into the van. Teams will split between Kate Curley Park and Highland Park, serve meals, clean up, and then return to the Soup Kitchen to prepare food for the following day.

We couldn't run this program without you. Your teams helped feed nearly 6,000 meals last summer and we truly appreciate your service and dedication to our community.

Trinity's Windows

The trustees have received a \$10,000 grant from the Idaho Heritage Trusts to help with the restoration of two more vent windows along the north aisle of the sanctuary. This is about one-third of the cost of the project. The project includes \$13,000 for window restoration, \$14,000 for three crates of custom glass, \$1,000 for shipping and \$3,000 for a contingency. We have received contributions from church members to help kick-start our fund raising and have identified other possible sources of funding, but still need the support of Trinity members and friends to make this project a reality.

As part of the planning process, a detailed condition report was prepared for both of the vent windows. We want to share a summary of the condition report in the newsletter so you will know why the windows need to be restored. The steel sashes of the two vent windows are stamped with identifying numbers 17 and 19. Since the condition of both vent

windows is similar, only the details of Sash 17 will be discussed in this article. A copy of the complete condition report can be requested from the church secretary or Richard Dickson.

A photo of the glass in Sash 17 is shown below.



A sketch of Sash 17 was prepared to document the visible cracks in individual panes of glass and identify the panels that have been replaced with mismatched glass.

The vent window has a total of 45 individual rectangular panes of glass. In Sash 17, eight panes have been replaced and eleven other panes have visible cracks. Silicone caulk has been smeared over some of the cracks to try to stabilize them. The silicone caulk will need to be removed during restoration.

The small panes along the border (Panels 1, 14, 15, 25, 40, 41, 42, 43, 44, 45 & 46) are called fillets. The fillets are almost entirely obscured by the angle iron of the sash, but based on past experience additional cracking is likely. In 1978, the windows

were installed using silicon caulk, rather than glazing cement which probably contributed to the cracking of the fillets. Damage obscured by the sash may also be present in the top edges of some panes along the top row of the vent (i.e., panes 2 to 13).

Depending on the severity of the cracking, some of the larger panes of the window may be repaired by gluing the pieces together with museum-grade epoxy. As an example, the cracking in pane 4 is shown in the following photo.



If the cracks in a pane cannot be repaired, the pane will need to be replaced. The replacement glass will come from three crates of custom-made glass that will be procured as part of this project to match the primary colors of glass in our windows. After procuring the custom glass, we will have an adequate supply of replacement glass to use for future restoration projects.

Seven panes (2, 13, 16, 24, 33, 36 & 39) have been replaced with a green and purple glass that looks like the colors in a watermelon (See pane 2 in the previous photo). The replacement glass has a smooth finish that is quite different from the rough granite-catspaw finish of the original 1917 glass. The mismatched panes will be replaced with better matches from the three crates of custom glass. The streaky amber

glass in pane 9 has been replaced with glass that is a relatively good match to the original. During the restoration, a decision will be made to either keep this pane or replace it with new custom-made glass.

No failed lead came was observed, however the stained glass in Sash 17 has a noticeable convex bow across both the length and width of the window. The sagging is probably caused by the downward pull of gravity when the vent window is open. During restoration, steel support bars will be installed to prevent future sagging.

We all admire and appreciate the beauty of our Trinity's stained glass windows. They represent a legacy from our past, and we need to be good stewards of this treasure. Now is the time to continue restoring the windows to their original beauty. The trustees will need the support of Trinity members and friends to raise the required funds to proceed with the restoration project.

Watching Trinity Worship Video Without a F.B. Account.


Yes, you can watch Trinity Sunday morning worship video without a Facebook account.

ON THE COMPUTER:

1. Go to GOOGLE CHROME web browser and type in:
2. <https://www.facebook.com/TUMCIF/>
3. The Trinity Facebook page comes up and you can see the video.
4. Then a Facebook "sign on" window comes up
5. At the bottom of the Sign on Window there was a "NOT NOW" button
6. Push that button and you are free to watch the live stream on a laptop without a Facebook account.

ON THE CELL PHONE:

1. Go to web browser and type in:

3. The Trinity Facebook page comes up and you can see the video.
4. Then a Facebook sign on window came up
5. Using your finger scroll down the screen
6. A second Facebook sign on window comes up
7. Close that 2nd window by pressing the "X" box up in the top right corner
8. You can see the video on the screen and play it by pressing the play triangle
9. It only shows the latest videos.
10. If you press SHOW ALL you can see all the videos back to March.
11. You are free to watch the live stream on an iPhone without a Facebook account.
