### Pastor's Perspective

*Indeed, the body does not consist of one member but of many. If the foot would say, "Because I am not a hand, I do not belong to the body," that would not make it any less a part of the body. And if the ear would say, "Because I am not an eye, I do not belong to the body," that would not make it any less a part of the body. If the whole body were an eye, where would the hearing be? If the whole body were hearing, where would the sense of smell be? But as it is, God arranged the members in the body, each one of them, as God chooses. If all were a single member, where would the body be? As it is, there are many members, yet one body. (1st Corinthians 12:14-20 ©NRSV)*

Dear sisters and brothers in Christ, We did it! Together we did it. The congregation of Trinity United Methodist Church completely funded the 2016 budget, including paying 100% of our Shared Ministry Apportionments! Wow - you are awesome. I am looking forward to seeing what kinds of stupendous things we can accomplish together in 2017. As those yet unseen ideas and plans unfold, I want to remind you to care for your spiritual lives so that you will be ready to answer the call that God places in your heart.

Our United Methodist heritage gives some fruitful help here. In the Class Meetings, the Methodists “watched over one another in love.” Their lives together were guided by the General Rules given to the United Societies by John Wesley. The General Rules are the Methodist rule of life.

This Methodist rule of life was general because it allowed for the diverse personalities, needs, and spiritual maturity of the members of the class meeting. It was a rule because it was a guide to help the Methodists orient their corporate and individual lives toward Christ and his life in the world. It is like a compass that helps keep a traveler on course to their destination. For the Methodists, the destination was holiness of heart and life. They were on a journey together guided by their rule of life. Being accountable to and with one another, “watching over one another in love,” helped them make progress along the way.

The General Rules are very simple:

1. Do no harm by avoiding evil of every kind; especially that which is most generally practiced...
2. Do good as often as you can to as many as you can, to their bodies and to their souls ...

3. Practice the means of grace:

- Private and family prayer
- Public worship
- Bible reading and study
- The Lord’s Supper
- Fasting or abstinence

These rules help us to grow closer to God and each other.

Imagine that God is the center of this wheel, and we humans are the outer rim.

Discipleship, practicing the means of grace, is how we move from the circumference of the circle closer and



closer to the center. In the process, we grow in love and are drawn closer and closer to our neighbor and to God. Living the General Rules within relationships of mutual accountability and support in small groups empowers and equips women, men, youth, and children to grow up and grow toward the One who is creating, redeeming, and sustaining them in love.

May we all hold each other up and accomplish great works in the Lord this year!

## Building Preservation - Board of Trustees

Your trustees are working to implement the The National Fund for Sacred Places (NFSP) grant opportunity for Trinity. Their grant process includes support and training to develop the preservation plan, and to run a successful capital funds campaign.

Accomplishments in January:

- ⇒ Received a \$5,000 Planning Grant from National Fund for Sacred Places which will help pay for the assessment report.
- ⇒ Inspection of the church building by a team of engineers and receipt of a draft copy of their assessment report on the building's condition.
- ⇒ Trinity team attended the training in Fort Worth, TX, about strategies for fundraising. Included were Rev. Ruth, Nancy Stewart, and Mike Bean who will spearhead the Capital Campaign.

Activities for February will include:

- ⇒ Receipt of the final assessment report on the building condition.
- ⇒ Preparing the fund raising campaign.

Future Phase One Activities - Using the Idaho Heritage Grant Money:

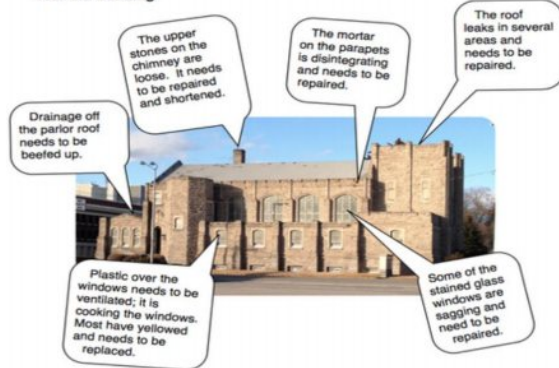
- ⇒ (May?) We are waiting for the weather to warm up enough so the new mortar securing the stonework will cure properly.

## Regional Council for Christian Ministry By Linda Milam

### **Committee Reports:**

**F.I.S.H.** served 27 families in December, mostly for health care issues; over 880 school supply orders have been filled this school year.

**Community Food Basket** served 812 families in December; in 2016 over 10,000 families were served though the number is a decrease from 2014 and 2015. A new warehouse with 15,000 sq. ft. of space has been secured; costs of rent, utilities, etc., will be \$70,000 per year, but the ability to accept and store free food from the Idaho Food Bank and other sources will more than recover that cost (for example, one shipment in January was valued at \$70,000).

### **Lenten Series:**

Lenten services will be offered on Fridays (March 10, 17, 24 and 31 and April 7). As in past years, a light soup and bread lunch will be provided at

### **Community News:**

**Soup Kitchen** served approximately 54,000 people during 2016. The organization is pursuing partnerships to result in savings (for example, they will be able to buy some items in bulk and store them at the Community Food Basket warehouse).

**Alternate Giving Fair** total contributions were \$14,100, divided among the 30 participating organizations. Because the nature of community giving has changed over the years, the event will not be held in 2017.

### **Other Business:**

2017 Administrative Costs for RCCM, divided among the 3 ministries is \$13,972, or 4% of expenses.



## Trustees Corner

A trustee's job is to take care of the church building, both in the long term restoration and in the day to day upkeep as well. This month:

- ⇒ We entered into a new snow removal contract to get a plowing service that is better in tune to our needs.
- ⇒ We addressed a water temperature issue and plumbing need at the parsonage.
- ⇒ We replaced some more steam traps in the Sanctuary to prevent steam from returning to the boiler.

### Emerging Issue:

- ⇒ We have a leak in the Parlor, possibly from a roof joint, that needs fixing. It was discovered January 11 when snow was melting.

Our boiler makes steam which flows to the radiators in the church. The steam in the radiator gives up its heat and it turns back to water. The steam trap lets the water leave the radiator and go back to the boiler but blocks the hot steam. When a steam trap fails it lets the hot steam go back to the boiler where it is vented into the boiler room

making a mess of the plaster and paint. There are about 70 steam traps in our heating system. Rob is working diligently to identify the failing traps and notifying the trustees to get them replaced
