Pastor's Perspective

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

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What did we do at Annual Conference?

Several legislative items passed and state-

Affirmed Ordained Ministry for All Persons

they would not consider orientation or sexual identity as reason to exclude LGBTQ persons from ministry.

Here is the Board of Ordained Ministry statement:

We as the Oregon-Idaho Board of Ordained Ministry believe this is a crucial time to declare how we operate in our work with those called by God into ordained ministry.

Because we have been a Reconciling Conference since 1996, because we have seen the gifts and graces for ministry in LGBTQ persons and have seen these same gifts too often denied, and because we hope to help lead change in our denomination's policy regarding LGBTQ persons in ordained ministry, we welcome all candidates as children of God as they discern God's call and claim upon them for ordained ministry. We hold our candidates to high standards for fitness, readiness, and effectiveness in ministry. We do not take sexual orientation or gender identity into our consideration of candidates.

Like our denomination, neither our own Board nor our own Conference membership is of one mind in this statement, and so, we pray for the Spirit of God to continue to move in our board, our conference and our denomination.

In these ways, they allow all qualified candidates to serve in ordained ministry, including all sexual orientations and gender identities.

The Clergy Session eventually approved a similar statement when they met together. So far, this is unique to OR-ID since other Annual Conferences only passed statements in their Boards of Ordained Ministries, not the full clergy session. It passed with over 80% approval.

Here is the statement from the clergy:

We the Clergy Session of the Oregon-Idaho Annual Conference believe this is a crucial time to declare how we operate in our work with those called by God into ordained ministry.

Because we have been a Reconciling Conference since 1996, because we have seen the gifts and graces for ministry in LGBTQ persons and have seen these same gifts too often denied, and because we hope to help lead change in our denomination's policy regarding LGBTQ persons in ordained ministry, we welcome all candidates as children of God as they discern God's call and claim upon them for ordained ministry.

We hold ourselves to high standards for fitness, readiness, and effectiveness in ministry. We commit to participate fully in the ministerial covenant with our colleagues of all sexual orientations and gender identities.

Like our denomination, neither our own clergy

session nor our own conference membership is of one mind in this statement, and so, we pray for the Spirit of God to continue to move in our clergy session, our conference and our denomination.

<u>Joined the Religious Coalition for</u> <u>Reproductive Choice</u>

Next, the Conference approved a floor vote on two petitions that supported the Religious Coalition for Reproductive Choice and caused the Oregon-Idaho Conference to actually join the Coalition. Here's why this is important:

The Religious Coalition for Reproductive Choice is an important interfaith advocacy group for women's health. This resolution would state that the Oregon-Idaho Annual Conference supports RCRC and would become a member of RCRC.

For over 40 years RCRC has been a voice for reproductive choice and has been active in working with people- especially those at the margins- at the intersection of faith, policy, and reproductive life. Denominational support was removed in 2016 by General Conference. We in Oregon-Idaho stand with women and those persons who can become pregnant in recognizing that reproductive choices should happen between a person and their doctor. We want to clearly say that we disagree with removal of the denominational membership and offer our public support instead.

Since the General Conference declined to participate in reproductive health advocacy for women, I'm glad my annual conference has chosen to maintain the relationship, although at a lower level than before. This shows that what General Conference undoes, the Annual Conferences can lead on, albeit in a patchwork form.

Affirmed the Bishops' Commission as passed at General Conference

The Annual Conference approved a floor vote on a petition supporting the Bishops' Commission studying human sexuality. Here's why this is important:

A Way Forward is the Bishops' Special Commission to study and rewrite The United Methodist Church's policies on human sexuality for consideration by a called General Conference or the 2020 General Conference. This resolution would state that the Oregon-Idaho Annual Conference supports this process and gives our hopes for the Commission's best process. (Last month's newsletter has a copy of the Council of Bishop's statement from General Conference.)

Institutions move slowly and have sometimes unhelpful timelines for action. It is important that the Council of Bishops hear the wishes of the people most affected by the harmful policies of the Book of Discipline, and that the Special Commission implement timelines and considerations that meet the needs of the Annual Conferences and local churches to continue being in faithful, full ministry, with our vibrant and diverse communities. This is a painful process for us all and too often fear and hesitance intercede when we are called by the spirit to be bold and take action. Continuing to call for action and to hold the bishops and the commission accountable will mitigate the spiritually corrosive factors of bureaucratic inertia and institutional malaise. Hopefully the Bishops will take these considerations into account as they form this Commission.

We took care of some money matters

The Annual Conference passed a 2017 budget of \$3,746,156. This represents no change from 2016. There will be no raise in the recommended minimum compensation for clergy in 2017, and the billed amount to churches for health insurance will remain the same. The clergy share of the premium however, will go up by \$75 per month.

There was one interesting, and I think Spirit orchestrated, piece of financial shifting that occurred as the result of a motion from the floor. The District Superintendents and the Annual Conference staff had been slated for a 2% raise next year. Gwen Drake, who will become the District Superintendent for Sage District and Dean of the Cabinet as of July 1st, made a motion that the Appointive Cabinet be allowed to forgo their raise. The motion passed. The next motion was for the roughly \$11,200 savings to be used to create a new apportioned line item (people really get this money) for youth ministry. The current budget only has an asking (people get this money only if any is given) for youth and young adult ministries.

Trinity UMC's Dylann Rhys, who was a youth equalization member from Sage district, helped craft a 3 year plan developed and presented by the youth to improve youth ministry in our Annual Conference. It was lovely to see the Holy Spirit at work to bring together these 2 motions from the floor that happened to fall within proximity of each other.

Last but not least, we Commissioned Two Provisional Members.

Anna Cho will be serving a church in the greater Portland area, and Ric Shewell will continue to serve at St. Paul's in Idaho Falls. Please remember to congratulate Ric the next time you see him. He is an awesome colleague!

The Little Church in the Pines was built as a shared place of worship and was dedicated on July 6, 1941. It was originally developed as a mission project by First Lutheran Church with support from the regional Lutheran church in 1965. In 1968 it came under the administration of the RCCM.
