Pastor's Perspective

Dear Siblings in Christ,

The Oregon-Idaho Annual Conference will meet in Boise, Idaho June 13-16. Below are the pieces of legislation that will be acted upon by that body. I have given a brief description for each piece of legislation. The underlined name of the individual legislation is clickable to the full document if you are reading this article as a pdf on the computer.

Action Requests

AR - 1 [Revisions for Scholarship Policies of the Board of Ordained Ministry](#)

This revision clarifies the application process and requirements for persons in pastoral leadership positions to receive various types of continuing education funds.

AR - 2 [Inclusive Language to Be Used at Oregon-Idaho Conference and District Meetings and Worship](#)

This action will reflect the openness and acceptance of all persons in the business and worship of the Oregon-Idaho annual conference in the use of clearly inclusive language.

AR - 3 [Child Incarceration and the United Nations Convention on Rights of the Child](#)

We call on the United States Congress to join with 196 other nations in ratifying the United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child; and Direct the Conference Secretary to write to the Oregon and Idaho Congressional Representatives, as well as the President, Vice President and Secretary of State, encouraging them to support pending and proposed legislation regarding the rights of children.

AR - 4 [Electronic Distribution of the Conference Journal - Replace Conference Rules 4.052 and 4.053](#)

The downloadable Conference Journal shall be made publicly available online within two months of the adjournment of the Annual Conference session, with a "print-on-demand" publishing option also available.

AR - 5 [Cause the Oregon-Idaho Conference to Affirm Unity in Diversity to the General Conference \(2019\)](#)

Prior to the called General Conference in February 2019, the Oregon-Idaho Conference Secretary, on behalf of the Conference, shall send a letter to the head of each annual conference delegation with the text of the letter to be: The Oregon-Idaho Annual Conference urges the Council of Bishops and the General Conference to affirm unity in our diversity, challenge in love all that divides, and offer to all people God's saving grace through Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world. We pray that you will resist schism and express openness to diverse perspectives in matters of sexual identity and practice.

AR - 6 [Bi-Lingual Signage for Welcome](#)

By the year 2020 all permanent public signage at camps and other public facilities in Oregon-Idaho Annual Conference, including the conference center, will be bilingual, English and Spanish. Local ministry settings in Oregon-Idaho are encouraged to adopt bilingual signage. Congregations where there is a primary language other than English or Spanish will have signage with at least two languages.

Standing Resolutions

SR - 1 [Standing on the Side of Love](#)

Churches throughout the Oregon-Idaho Annual Conference welcome people of various ethnic groups, income levels, ability levels, religious backgrounds, sexual orientations and gender identities to find a spiritual home in their congregations. Members of Conference United Methodist churches include people of various sexual orientations who are involved in loving relationships. God calls us to stand on the side of love. We believe all relationships that are grounded in shared affection and are equitable in power reflect God's will. We support marriage between loving couples – gay, bisexual, lesbian, transgender, straight, celibate, or otherwise – that reflects such commitments.

SR - 2 [Supporting Middle East Peace Efforts](#)

We urge our US and world leaders to carefully explore appropriate actions that will eventually help to end the terrorism that continues to be nurtured in the Middle East. We call upon United Methodists and other people of faith and good conscience to work for peace, to help change policies for the better and to improve human rights for all people.

SR - 3 [Repair and Strengthen the 1965 Voting Rights Act](#)

The Oregon-Idaho Annual Conference supports repairing the 1965 Voting Rights Act that was decimated by the 2013 U.S. Supreme Court Shelby County v. Holder decision. The weakened Voting Rights Act has allowed many states to place barriers to voting, including strict voter ID laws and residency requirements and prohibition of same-day registration. The voters most affected by these obstacles are racial minorities, the poor, the elderly and young people.

SR - 4 [National Fair Trade Policy](#)

This standing resolution is consistent with the Social Principles. The International Standards of Fair Trade are based on ensuring livable wages for farmers and their families.

SR - 5 [Support for Inclusive Lay Staff Employment Policy](#)

The Oregon-Idaho Conference is committed to employment practices in which laity called to serve are employed and dismissed without regard for sexual orientation or gender identity.

SR - 6 [Support the Abolition of Human Trafficking \(2009; r.2012, r. 2015\)](#)

Neither Oregon or Idaho have enacted Safe Harbor laws that treat sexually trafficked adults and children as victims of crime rather than perpetrators of crime. Therefore, we urge individuals, churches and church related organizations to research the status of Safe Harbor legislation in their own states. We believe that our ministry of reconciliation requires us to work towards ending human trafficking and to minister to the immediate needs of those who live in the fear, loneliness and physical pain that accompany human trafficking, offering hope and help to escape.

SR - 7 [Climate Change](#)

We resolve to take positive action to curb emissions that contribute to global climate change. As stewards of God's creation we acknowledge our way of living, specifically our use of energy, creates emissions that affect the climate and threaten all life. We resolve to support the creation of laws and policies that will lead to decreases in the dangerous emissions that threaten our planet.

SR - 8 [Aligning Investments with Values Regarding Palestine and Israel](#)

We call for all Oregon-Idaho United Methodist boards and agencies, districts, local churches and individuals to prayerfully consider avoiding companies involved in Israel's occupation of Palestine when making investment decisions, and/or utilizing their purchasing power; and Encourage United Methodists to partner with Jews, Christians, Muslims and other people of conscience working for corporate accountability, human rights, true peace and security for all people in Israel and Palestine, and an end to the illegal Israeli occupation of Palestine.

SR - 9 [Close the Western Hemispheric Institute for Security Cooperation](#) (formerly named the School of the Americas or SOA)

We resolve to continue to support the endeavor to close the WHINSEC located on the U.S. Army Base at Fort Benning, Georgia. WHINSEC trains Latin American military and law enforcement personnel in inhumane, oppressive tactics such as torture, assassination and kidnapping, to control their populations.

SR - 10 [Human Rights for Incarcerated Children](#)

The Oregon/Idaho Conference of the United

Methodist Church formally endorses the application of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights as it applies to incarcerated children.

Trinity will be well represented at Annual Conference. Salt Lake City Wesley Bell Ringers Concert - June 23 at 7:30 pm

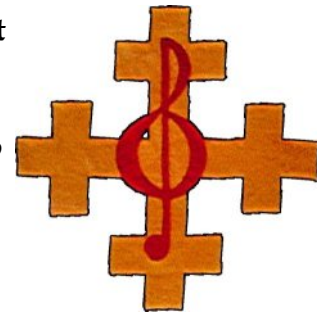

Regional Council for Christian Ministry

The Regional Council for Christian Ministry met on Tuesday, May 15 at the Soup Kitchen. Dave Manson, the director of the Community Food Basket, was our host and gave the prayer and meditation.

The first report was from FISH. Bev Kemp reported that their biggest outreach this past month was healthcare at the Community Family Clinic. They help cover \$20 of the cost, which is based on a sliding scale due to income. Because they are able to help with up to \$50, that gives them the option of helping with medication after the person has been seen.

FISH also reported that they gave out 780 backpacks of school supplies this past school year.

Dave Manson reported that the Community Food Basket provided food for 877 families in April. Also in April, the Soup Kitchen fed 3383.

During the Idaho Gives campaign, a total of \$9,366 was donated to the Community Food Basket online and through partnerships with local businesses. \$6,000 was donated to the Soup Kitchen.

Scouting for Food collected 30,000 pounds of food this year, and Broulims and Smiths are still bringing food in.

Last month, Connie Day stepped down as the RCCM chair and Jane Kaestner took her place.

This month, it was voted that JoAnn Biery take Jane's place as vice-chair. The vote was a unanimous yes!

There has been a need in Idaho Falls for emergency family housing for years. In response to that need, a new mission called Promise Ridge, co-sponsored by First Presbyterian and St. Vincent de Paul has begun. St. Vincent de Paul received a grant and First Presbyterian has donated the use of the house at 288 N. Ridge. They have a board of directors and are excited to begin! FISH will be providing the non-food consumables for the families (paper products, cleaning supplies, personal hygiene supplies, etc.) Please prayerfully consider donating to this new outreach in our community.

New Day Lutheran will be coordinating the Children's Summer Feeding Program here in Idaho Falls this summer. Volunteers will be needed to help with the cooking and the serving. They will be serving lunch at the shelter on the greenbelt across from the roundabout Monday, Wednesday and Friday from 11am-1pm beginning June 19th through August 18th. 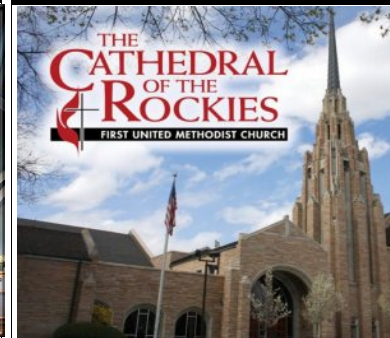
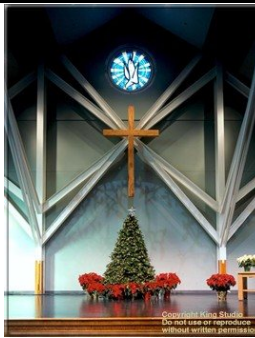
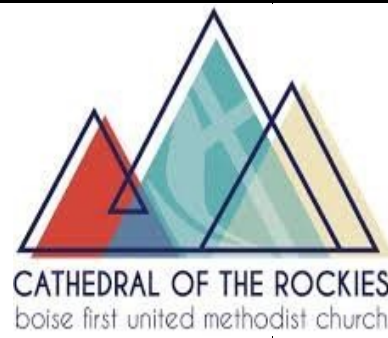

Trinity Restoration - Nancy Stewart

April and May have been busy for Trinity Restoration. Fundraising is going well and we are excited to share the following highlights for the newsletter.

◆Highlander Masonry started and completed the work in May. Work included: repair and repointing masonry parapet walls, removing loose mortar joints, securing flashings, repointing mortar joints missing mortar, and cleaning masonry stains. The chimney has been stabilized, and two rows of stone removed and stored in the boiler room for future repairs.

◆Robinson Roofing has been hired to replace the existing roofing systems, flashings, reglets, terminations, drains, and associated roofing specialties on sanctuary and parlor. They indicated they would start in August.

◆Richard Creason of Myers Anderson Architectural firm, has completed our 60 percent design review for the bathrooms, upstairs kitchen, Parlor flooring and ceiling, electrical panel upgrades outside Men's room on the main floor.

◆Myers Anderson met with us one more time on the drawings, and submitted them to the City of Idaho Falls for a Building Permit in May. They will send a package out for bids to General Contractors. Interior work start date will depend on General Contractor availability. Our hope is for this summer.

◆\$2,000 was raised from the spaghetti dinner. What a fun evening and thanks to all the helpers including Troop 6 Boy Scouts!

◆\$1,500 was raised from the Jamming for Bread. Thank you, Camille. The Hillcrest Jazz Band and



Jazz Choir performers are excellent! It was an uplifting performance and the acoustics were excellent in our beautiful Sanctuary.

◆King George Royal Flush scoped our sewer pipes in April and the data will be used for the General Contractor bids. The pipes look good.

◆Brick garden details are being worked on and will be discussed at Trustees and the Admin Council with a decision of vendor and color by August.

The Trinity Restoration Steering Committee is: Mike Bean, Doug French, Roger Haga, Bev Kemp, Mike Lehto, Ruth Marsh, Linda Milam Hersch Mynarcik, Don Rohde, Nancy Stewart, Scott Taylor, and Pam Traugher.

Our fundraising is ongoing as we have heard construction costs are high due to the eastern Idaho construction boom;

100% of Trinity Restoration funding will be used for the work needs listed in the TUMC Facilities Assessment we completed in 2017. No money will be put into our general funds.

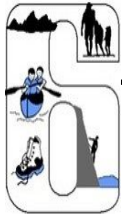
Arrangements have been made to audit our fundraising money receipts and expenditures this summer.
