Worship Plans for 5/14

Theme: Knowing God
 Sermon: "At Home in God"
 Focus Scripture (Acts 17:22-31)

Athenians, as I have walked your streets, I have observed your strong and diverse religious ethos. You truly are a religious people. I have stopped again and again to examine carefully the religious statues and inscriptions that fill your city. On one such altar, I read this inscription: "TO AN UNKNOWN GOD." I am not here to tell you about a strange foreign deity, but about this One whom you already worship, though without full knowledge. This is the God who made the universe and all it contains, the God who is the King of all heaven and all earth. It would be illogical to assume that a God of this magnitude could possibly be contained in any man-made structure, no matter how majestic. Nor would it be logical to think that this God would need human beings to provide Him with food and shelter – after all, He Himself would have given to humans everything they need – life, breath, food, shelter, and so on.

This God made us in all our diversity from one original person, allowing each culture to have its own time to develop, giving each its own place to live and thrive in its distinct ways. His purpose in all this was that people of every culture and religion would search for this ultimate God, grope for Him in the darkness, as it were, hoping to find Him. Yet, in truth, God is not far from any of us. For you know the saying, "We live in God; we move in God; we exist in God." And still another said, "We are indeed God's children." Since this is true, since we are indeed offspring of God's creative act, we shouldn't think of the Deity as our own artifact, something made by our own hands – as if this great, universal, ultimate Creator were simply a combination of elements like gold, silver, and stone. No, God has patiently tolerated this kind of ignorance in the past, but now God says it is

time to rethink our lives and reject these unenlightened assumptions. God has fixed a day of accountability, when the whole world will be justly evaluated by a new, higher standard: not by a statue, but by a living man. God selected this man and made Him credible to all by raising Him from the dead..

Last Week's Sermon 5/7

Theme for the day: The Guide
 Sermon: "Great Spirit's Pathway"
 Focus Scripture: (John 14:1-7)




Last week we heard how Jesus is the Good Shepherd who skillfully guides the sheep, and how Jesus is also the gate which enables the sheep to come and go from the safety of the corral to lush pastures that offer abundant life, and then back to safety. Today, we hear how Jesus is the very road that we, the sheep of God's fold, must travel to enter into the heart of our Creator.



As Jesus talks to the disciples in this morning's Gospel lesson, he prepares them for the reality that he will be "moving on" soon, to live in Great Spirit's Lodge. God's home is spacious enough that Jesus can go prepare a mansion for each of them. Although the disciples struggle to wrap their brains around Jesus' imminent departure, Peter is flummoxed by being told that they know the way to get to their eternal home with the Lord.

Peter, I get you... I want a map!
David is moving this week and I will be moving in about 6 weeks, so figuring out how to get from one place to another is pretty high on my mind. Can we possibly get everything packed and all of the open tasks completed?



However, there are even more troubling words to be found in this passage than Jesus thinking we can do the impossible. Let me read them to you in a little bit more familiar translation of the Gospel of John: Jesus said to him, "I am the way and the truth and the life. No one comes to the Father except through me.

These are words that we must wrestle with as people of love and faith and peace and justice in the world we find ourselves in. Before it feels as if you have been pinned to the mat, remember that Jesus did not address these words to the Hindus or the Muslims or even to those Jews who did not believe in him.



those of us who were *already* his followers and who were confused about what to believe. "I am the truth. Believe in me." He addressed them to those of us who were *already* his followers and who were fearful for the future. "I am the life. Come live in union with me."



It is not our job to discern whether or not faithful Buddhism offers a genuine way to life in God. It is our job to live faithfully the way we have been called to follow. And faithfully taking the Way of Jesus is done by following Jesus, not by worrying about where the edges of the path might be. Faithful following the way of Jesus will not make us hostile to people of other faiths or no faith, but it will make us distinctly and boldly different from them.

We who have chosen the Jesus Way must follow his lead to God. We must let Jesus be our guide. A guide can help us get from place to place (think tour guide) or we might choose to have a mentor who is our guide to navigate life. In today's scripture lesson from the First Nations Version had we read further, we would have been invited to follow our Divine Guide, Jesus, on Great Spirit's Good Road. What a great description of the Kingdom of God and the life journey that Jesus is ready to show us.



Homeless Services

In April, 71 people received services in the 16 days we were open. This represents 31 unique individuals whose ages range from 18 to 70 with an average of 47. The average time in the church was 52 min with a range of 1 min to 5 hours. 9 people registered as first-time visitors. The services included 57 showers, 16 loads of laundry, 12 supplies which included drinking water, sleeping bag, 3 pair of socks, and 2 hygiene kits. 14 people use the mailbox service. 72% of the visitors had valid ID cards and 63% had a phone.

Just a reminder, there will be no meetings in June and July. If you're interested, there will also be an ice-cream social on August 10th.





Stained-Glass Window Repair

The project to procure replacement-stained glass for our windows has hit a snag. In the last status meeting, we were informed by Nzilani Glass Conservation that the vendor that was lined up to provide our replacement glass was experiencing challenges. The machine that rolls out the “Cats Paw” texture on the stained glass had a chipped gear. Each time the missing tooth came around it made a wave in the glass. In addition, they needed to take a break during the summer months to replace the roof of their building. We are waiting until mid-July to check on the progress of the repairs on the roller tooth and the roof.

This is not a showstopper for our restoration project. Plan “B” includes repairing rather than replacing existing pieces of glass and a nationwide search for matching replacement-stained glass pieces. Plan “B” is very much like the process we used for the first two windows.


