



# How to Talk with Your District Superintendent

#### Leadership Retreat Nov. 3-5

The United Methodist system for getting the right pastors to the right churches is a bit convoluted. To understand the system, we need to start with the fact that we are a connectional system, which means all our churches and pastors rely on each other to be the Body of Christ in the world. We trust that we are all working toward the growth of the Kingdom of God on earth. We've been this way (connected) since the time of John Wesley.

For this system to work, we need a lot of trust and a lot of communication between the leadership of each church and the district superintendent. We place our trust in our DS and the entire Cabinet; (the bishop and all the DSs of the area) to discern, with the help of the Holy Spirit, what configuration of pastoral leadership will work best for our congregations and who might be the best pastor for each church. At the same time, the leadership of the church has a great responsibility to discern God's will for the church and commit to the vision we develop from this discernment.

To help us prepare for our responsibilities in this system we are going to be holding a leadership retreat from Friday to Sunday, Nov. 3-5. Brian Shimer and Andrew Arthur of Genesis Christian Mediation will be joining us as we practice discernment skills, develop our vision out of that discernment, and learn how to listen to and communicate well with our district superintendent Karen Hernandez. We also need to learn to listen clearly to Karen as she explains to us the scope of her work as district superintendent to the churches of the Sage District. We are

expecting a lot of pastoral changes in the district this year and DS Karen oversees them all.


#### We will be meeting on:

### How to Talk with Your Pastor

Someone at Trinity asked me why we have set up a communion table down in front of the altar (on "ground level") rather than use the very nice communion altar that is built in, high up a flight of stairs, in the front of the sanctuary. My very nuanced, theologically informed answer was, "I don't want to fall going up or down those stairs." That answer seemed to satisfy the questioner, but it brought up a whole host of questions about why the folks who built the Trinity building designed the sanctuary that way. The reason is that we used to believe there should be a distance maintained between pastors and congregants. The pastor was thought of as separate and special, and churches were designed with spaces that only the pastor (and choir!) could enter. In addition, the pastor was literally "elevated" above the congregation, symbolizing their closeness to God, and their spiritual superiority over the congregation. Also, the grandness of the design was supposed to remind the congregation of the greatness of God.

It's obvious that our view of pastors has changed drastically over the last half century. A comparison of the design of St. Paul's sanctuary to that of Trinity's gives us a clear visual showing how attitudes have changed. St. Paul's sanctuary reflects the idea that pastors are now seen as being on the same "level" as the congregation.

However, now we are often unclear as to what the role and authority of a pastor are. Lucky for us, Rev. John Tucker, district superintendent of the Crater Lake district, is going to be helping us understand pastoral authority today, and how pastors and congregants can work together to live into

the church's vision. Rev. Tucker will be preaching for us on Oct. 22, and will be leading a workshop on this topic at 4 pm at Trinity United Methodist church.

In the meantime, I can tell you we do have a clear process for talking with your pastor whenever a problem or disagreement arises. (You can talk with me when we agree as well!) If you have a problem with anything I say or do, I invite you to speak with me directly, as soon as possible. I am available in person during the first part of the month, and you can reach me by phone, email, or text the rest of the time. If you don't feel comfortable speaking with me directly, please talk with the SPR chair of your church (Bev Kemp at Trinity and Tracy Gohr at St. Paul's). When we communicate directly, it is easier to solve problems. The days of seeing the pastor as both set apart from the congregation, and as an unapproachable leader are gone. I'm just like you, but with some special knowledge and skills that allow me to help you live into your vision. I'm just like you: scared of falling down those stairs in the Trinity sanctuary!

#### **Homeless Services**

In September there were 162 homeless services supplied in the 16 days we were open. This represented services to 67 unique people. The services provided included 137 showers, 44 loads of laundry, and 20 requests for supplies. The supplies included emergency food, Tarp(4), socks(5), underwear (3), gas(1), mail(2), and WIFI to study for a class(7). The clients ranged in age from 14 to 78 with an average age of 46.7. Time in the church varied from 4 min to 300 minutes with an average of 67 minutes. 19 visitors were new clients for us. 55% have cellphones and 81% have valid ID.

#### **IF Soup Kitchen**

For 20 years the Idaho Falls Soup Kitchen has been providing a free meal to anyone 365 days a year from 12 to 1 p.m. at 301 S. Boulevard — no questions asked. The soup kitchen serves an average of 125 meals per day, said Eric Hamlin, the kitchen's director. Some days that total rises to 200 meals. The kitchen served 3,593 meals in September and approximately 33,058 meals so far in 2023.

For many years Trinity and St. Paul's were the cooks and servers for every Monday of the year. That responsibility has now been passed on to new organizations.

### Life of a Church Workshop

(Meeting Notes by Don Rohde)

District Superintendent John Tucker spoke at the Sunday afternoon workshop about the "Life Cycle of a Church" He described it in 7 stages represented by letters.

#### Growth:

 $\underline{\mathbf{V}}$  = Someone has a  $\underline{\mathbf{Vision}}$  of a need

<u>VR</u> = People collect and form <u>Relationships</u> around that <u>Vision</u>.

<u>VRM</u> = The people in <u>Relationship</u> start <u>Ministries</u> to enact their <u>Vision</u>.

<u>VRMS</u> = It is necessary to create a <u>Structure</u> of committees and paperwork to support the **Ministries** decline

**vRMS** = The **vision** is forgotten but the existing missions continue, and the relationships and structure are strong. You hear terms like "Church Family"

**vRmS** = With the vision gone the **ministries** begin to drop away. What you have is a social club lamenting "all the things we use to do."

<u>vrmS</u> = As the people leave the <u>relationships</u> fall apart. You hear people say, "Where have all the people gone?" The structure of committees and paperwork are the last things to go.

John wanted us to look at our churches and possibly other not-for-profits we are involved in and see where we thought we were in the lifecycle of the organization.

The next exercise was called "Sacred Cows". The goal was to identify things we held more dear or were more concerned about that our mission. A few that came up were:

- 1. Our beautiful historic building We are curators of a historic building with all the costs and time commitments involved.
- 2. Our 107-year history in Idaho Falls. There is a proud tradition of Methodism in Idaho Falls. Are we looking back and not forward?
- 3. Our worship style. Everyone has a different preference of worship style from Traditional to Praise to downright Theatrical. Is our worship style a challenge to where we are headed?

We will see the full list some time in the future. Each "Sacred Cow" is loaded with emotion and personal feelings and can be a distraction from who we might want to become. Because of all the energy around Sacred Cows they are very hard to overcome.

The third topic was "**Pick A Pastor**". Pastors come in 4 basic flavors, and they are sometimes exclusive of other flavors.

- Generalist A little bit good at all aspects of running a church.
- Nurturing Excellent at nurturing those in need in congregation, hospital, and the community.
- 3. Reforming Making bold changes and leading in new directions.
- 4. Starter Building new churches and new programs. (not necessary running them)

The challenge is that if a church asks for a generalist pastor, they may be disappointed when the pastor does not make bold changes or really enjoy hospital visits. Likewise, if the church asks for a reformer to turn the church around, they may be disappointed in the

nurturing and general clerical performance of the pastor.

There are additional challenges in the lack of pastors applying for open positions. This makes matching the skill set of the pastor to the churches more difficult.
