Lyle went into public high school and was actively involved in sports throughout these years and played football, basketball and baseball. Following high school he spent two years at college with no clear goals and opted to join the Naval Nuclear Propulsion Program. While in the Navy Lyle met his wife Trudy while stationed in Idaho Falls and loved her so much that he not only proposed but proceeded to lead her around the country (Washington State, New York, and Minnesota) before bringing her back to her family and community.

After Lyle and Trudy moved back to Idaho Falls and were looking to baptize their first child it was clear that they were to baptize Erika into the United Methodist Church at Trinity. This decision was met with a period of time where Lyle first looked at his Catholic faith with a real questioning attitude. Following the baptism of their second child, Nathan, Lyle began to look seriously at joining the United Methodist Church so that there would be no confusion for his children as they grew older. At one point during a family get together he had joked that "if Pastor Brenda were to stay he would join the church" (coming from a strong Catholic background he was only half serious). A few days following this comment his mother-in-law (Donna Oltmanns) called to inform him that Pastor Brenda was staying!!!

Although this is true Lyle received a copy of the Book of Discipline and the Book of Resolutions and began to study them as well review his Catholic Catechism. While studying Lyle decided that his beliefs were more in

line with the United Methodist Church and that becoming a member was the best thing for himself (spiritually) and his family. This decision was not taken lightly and took several years as he was raised in a very Catholic family, community, and the word "Catholic" was part of his identity. Although this was a very difficult, personal, and spiritual decision, Lyle is grateful to be joining the United Methodist Church.

An update on Giovanni as of Oct 21, 2013:

Giovanni is married to our daugh-

ter, Heather and they live here in Idaho Falls with their 3 children, Giovi (9), Adellyna (6), and Eliana (2). Giovanni was diagnosed with (ALL) Acute Lymphoblastic Leukemia in Oct. 2011. He went through aggressive treatment and was declared in remission in the Spring of 2012. He was in maintenance treatment but doing very well and was able to return to work. In June 2013 continued blood tests revealed cancer again. Since then he has been in treatment and spent 5+ weeks in the hospital only to have the treatment not work. Tests continued to give mixed results and the cancer cells appear to be a rare form. He is now going to hospital at the Huntsman Cancer Center in Salt Lake City where we pray they will be able to give him treatment to kill the cancer cells. We hope he will be able to have a bone marrow transplant but he has to be in remission and physically able in all other ways to have this procedure. His older sister is a match and will donate to him. This will all take time. He will now have to be separated from the family which will be difficult. Heather will be with him some

of the time but must continue to work as she can at EIRMC here in Idaho Falls. The 3 children will be in our care. The hospital does not allow the children to visit so we plan for them to see their "Papi" via the computer and Mommy when she can be with them. Many challenges are ahead for us all. Please keep us in your daily prayers. Heather has set up a special site through the Internet on the computer with the Caring Bridge organization. Anyone can view this site and keep up to date on Giovanni. Please look at it often and send messages to Giovanni and Heather. This is what you do.

Since 2007 and 2009 when I was part of VIM teams who traveled to the UMCORDepot in Louisiana, I have organized an opportunity for people in our community to put together School Bag Kits for Disaster Relief. I have invited members of FFL (Friends for Learning) to participate as well as people from several churches in this community.

This year I had 20 people come to a workshop on Sept 17 at Trinity where we cut donated fabric, using a specific pattern, into school bags. In less than 2 hours we had over

100 bags cut and ready to sew. Now I have various people sewing them together. Anyone is invited to help with this. There is an on going need for these kits. The School Bags are only one of the kits used by UMCOR and other Humanitarian groups for disasters all over the world. News from the United Methodist Committee on Relief

UMCOR supports US disaster relief

Last week, during their semiannual meeting, the board of directors of the United Methodist Committee on Relief (UMCOR) approved six grants for ongoing US disaster recovery work in five United Methodist annual conferences: Kansas-West, Tennessee, Central Texas, New York, and Susquehanna. Nearly \$700,000 in new grants will support long-term recovery efforts from multiple disasters which occurred earlier this year and provide disaster case management, reconstruction, and spiritual and emotional care support.

The sum also includes support for the ongoing recovery efforts of the New York Annual Conference and the Susquehanna Conference following, respectively, Superstorm Sandy in 2012, and Hurricane Irene and Tropical Storm Lee in 2011. In addition, more than \$6.3 million was approved to support ten projects in Japan following the devastating triple disaster in 2011. The funds will support psychosocial projects, reconstruction, capacity building, disaster risk reduction, and livelihoods development, as well as awareness-raising of issues related to nuclear energy and radiation poisoning.

UMCOR directors also approved grants for work in Cuba, Haiti, and Zimbabwe. In Cuba, \$500,000 will support reconstruction of 100 damaged or destroyed homes caused by Hurricane Sandy last year. In Haiti, a \$300,000 grant to partner Church World Service (CWS) will benefit 55 families in the underserved rural communities of Ganthier and Boen. And in Zimbabwe, funding will support the work of UMCOR’s country office to meet the needs of orphans and vulnerable children in the rural Chimanimani District.
