Pastor's Perspective

Dear Siblings in Christ,

This Fall, between vacation and some church meetings, I see many gaps in the times I will be in the office so it seemed like a good time for an FAQ -- Frequently Asked Questions about reaching the pastor.

How can I reach the pastor?

I am almost always available by phone. My regular office hours are 10am to 3pm Monday through Thursday. The office number is (208) 522-7921. Other days and times I can be reached by cell phone at (208) 419-7870. If I am with someone I may not answer the phone, so please be sure to leave a message so that I can return your call. You are also welcome to text my cell phone or chat with me via Facebook. My email address is: revruthmarsh@gmail.com

When can I speak to the pastor privately?

We can arrange to get together whenever or wherever it is convenient for you. Even during office hours you may want to call ahead to make sure that someone else isn't already meeting with the pastor. I am happy to meet you at the church some other time if office hours don't work. If coming to the office is difficult or inconvenient for you, I am glad to make a home visit. Another option might be for us to do coffee or even lunch some time.

Should I expect the pastor to visit me at home on a regular basis?

You need to let me know if you would like a home visit. If your name has been raised in prayer recently at church I may call by phone to see how things are and ask if you would like a pastoral visit, otherwise, it is unlikely that the pastor will show up on your doorstep without some prompting. You can call either church office, or you can call me on my cell phone to make arrangements for a visit. A sure way to get a phone call from the pastor is to check the "I'd like to receive a call from the pastor" space on the welcome and prayer slip.

Will the pastor come visit me in the hospital?

Yes!--if I know that you are there. If you are planning surgery please let me know the date and time that you will be arriving at the hospital so I can come and sit with you and your family before and during surgery. I'll try to be there when you wake up. If you go to the hospital unexpectedly please

be sure to have a friend or family member call me. Even if you tell the hospital what church you belong to they will not let us know that you are there. Due to federal privacy laws the hospital can not tell me how you are doing if I call. They may not even tell me if you are there or what room you are in if I don't know the exact name under which you registered at the hospital.

What if I need pastoral care when Pastor Ruth is out of town?

There is always someone on call when I am away on vacation and may be out of cell phone range. Call the church office and Pam will let you know who is on call and how you can best reach them if I am unavailable. She can help figure out how your needs will best be met.

What kinds of things should I talk to the pastor about?

Just about anything! Whenever you need a set of safe, compassionate, confidential ears is a good time to call the pastor. I don't necessarily have all the answers, but we can look at what's going on, and then prayerfully consider what God might be calling you to do in this situation.




